Privacy (GDPR) Notice: How the INHS handles your data

As many of you may be aware, there are new rules governing the way that bodies record and maintain personal data within the EU. The INHS has sought professional advice on this and we have been assured that, based on the form and purpose of the Network and the type of data that is submitted via our homepage, we fulfil the obligations under the new GDPR rules. Nonetheless, in light of the introduction of the GDPR we felt that it was important to provide the following information about the way we collect and handle your personal information. We take our obligations for data handling very seriously and it is therefore important for you to know that the lawful basis for us processing your information is that consent has been provided by the data subject.

What information do we collect from you?

When individuals join the International Network for Hate Studies via our homepage they submit the following information:

- Name
- Email address

This data is held on a listerv via the online mailing company Mailchimp and the data is kept up to date when requests are made to change email addresses or names. We will hold this data only as long as you would like to remain a member of the INHS.

Why do we hold the data?

We have this data about you so that we can send you our monthly newsletter and information about our biennial conference and other information relating to hate studies.

We do not use the data we collect to make decisions about individuals or to analyse information on an individual level and your data will not be shared with any other organisation.

How can you amend or erase your data?

Where the data we hold on you is inaccurate, you may request that we rectify these inaccuracies via our "contact us" section on the website.

You have the right to have your data erased by us.

Each time we send you an INHS newsletter you will have the right to opt out of receiving information and your database record will be amended and you will no longer receive information from us. The links are provided at the end of each email we send to you (see below).
